



PBird Song in the Classroom

Age: 6⁺ years **Duration:** 40 minutes

This is a really fun activity, mindfully engaging the senses by focusing on aural and observational skills.



Materials:

- A link to the internet
- Whiteboard & Speakers
- Web-links to 3-4 common birds on the RSPB website.

Directions:

- Watch the video footage and play the sound files of your chosen birds and ask students to talk about:
 - o the appearance of the bird: size, shape, colours
 - the movements
 - the activities of the bird in the video
 - the sound of the bird
 - And what are the similarities and differences between the different types?
- Turn off the screen. Play the video and sound files again, telling the students which bird it is. Ask the students to listen and describe the birds' songs.
- Finally see if the students can recognise the different birds without any other information other than the song.
 - Get the students to close their eyes, and listen to snippets of the songs again- mix up the sequence of play, and pick different sections of the songs.
 - After each snippet, get the students to do a "hands up" e.g.
 if they think it is a Robin, a Great Tit, a Blackbird or a
 Kestrel. Tell them which one is singing after each go.

Extensions:

- After the exercise, put pictures of the birds up on screen again, and get each student to draw their favourite, or all birds.
