



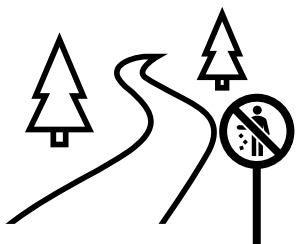
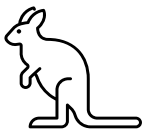
Around the world in Litter and Waste facts

of litter are dropped every minute

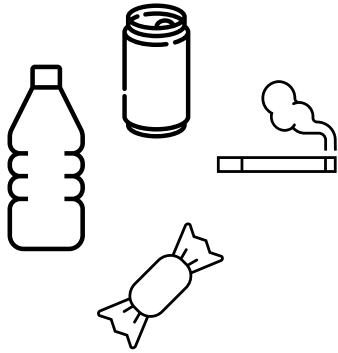


LitterBins.co.uk tell us that 122 tones

& cans are littered or thrown landfill

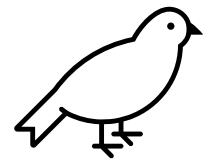


Over 51 billion pieces of litter land on U. S.

Study. They say that is 6,729 items per mile.



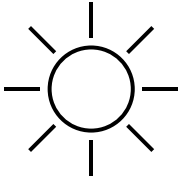
In Singapore, a 1st time litter offenders who throw small items like cigarette butts or sweet wrappers are fined \$300. Those who throw out bigger items like drink cans or bottles are required to appear before the court. The punishment usually involves them doing a clean up.

In Germany. There's a blue bin for paper, a brown or green bin for biodegradables, a yellow one for plastic and a black one for the rest. They also can return their deposit bottles to the supermarket and drop glass bottles at public collecting points.
