Read or listen to the book "Last Stop on Market Street" by Matt de la Peña with your class. The questions below offer a guide for discussion with your class, along with some actions and activities to complete.




Discussion Questions:

- 1. Have you ever taken a bus ride or used public transportation? What was it like?
- 2. Why do you think CJ's Nana chooses to ride the bus instead of driving a car?
- 3. What different parts of the city do CJ and his Nana see from the bus? How are these places similar or different from your neighbourhood?
- 4. What kinds of places do CJ and his Nana visit? Why are these places important for the community?
- 5. What types of people do CJ and his Nana meet on the bus? How do these people contribute to making the community diverse and interesting?
- 6. How does using the bus help the environment compared to driving individual cars? Can you think of other benefits of public transportation?
- 7. How do CJ and his Nana show that they care about their community? Can you think of ways you can help your own community?
- 8. What are some things you can do to help make your city or community more sustainable? (e.g., recycling, using public transport, planting trees)
- 9. Why is it important for cities to have places like the soup kitchen CJ and his Nana visit? How do these places help people in the community?
- 10. What are some differences between the city and the countryside? How can both places be made more sustainable?
- 11. If you could design a part of your city to make it better for everyone, what would you include? Think about parks, playgrounds, libraries, and other community spaces.
- 12. Imagine you are the mayor of your city. What three changes would you make to ensure your city is sustainable and inclusive for all its residents?
- 13.CJ initially feels unhappy about taking the bus. How does his perspective change by the end of the story? What does this tell you about the importance of keeping an open mind?
- 14. How do you think the different characters on the bus feel about their daily lives? Why is it important to understand and respect the experiences of others in our community?

- iii. Follow directions to construct 3D cities, if having difficulties watch construction video found here.






- 1. Colour and cut out all pieces of the city.






