Teaching children about Global Goal 16: Peace, Justice, and Strong Institutions is important to lay the foundation for a fair and just society where everyone's rights are respected. By learning about this goal through stories like "The Well of Lost Wishes" and "I Dissent: Ruth Bader Ginsburg Makes Her Mark," children understand the importance of resolving conflicts peacefully, upholding human rights, and promoting inclusive and accountable institutions. "The Well of Lost Wishes," an Irish Traveller tale, highlights themes of justice and fairness through its storytelling, encouraging empathy and understanding of diverse cultural perspectives. "I Dissent" introduces children to the life of Ruth Bader Ginsburg, emphasising her advocacy for gender equality and civil rights, inspiring them to stand up for justice and equality. These stories empower children to become active participants in creating a world where peace, justice, and strong institutions prevail for all.

#### **Discussion Questions:**

- 1. How does Ruth Bader Ginsburg show fairness and justice in the story?
- 2. Can you think of a time when you had to make a fair decision like Ruth did in the story?
- 3. What challenges did Ruth face in fighting for equal rights? How did she overcome them?
- 4. What can we learn from Ruth about solving problems fairly?
- 5. Why is it important for everyone to have equal rights? How does this help create peace in our communities?
- 6. Have you ever stood up for someone's rights or seen someone else do it? How did it make you feel?
- 7. How did Ruth Bader Ginsburg make a difference in the lives of others through her work as a judge?
- 8. What are some ways you can help make your school or community a fairer and more just place?
- 9. What does a strong institution look like? How can schools, courts, and other institutions help ensure fairness and justice for everyone?
- 10. How can we make sure that everyone in our community feels safe and treated fairly?
- 11. Ruth Bader Ginsburg believed in respecting differences. What does that mean to you? Why is it important?
- 12. How can we celebrate and learn from people who are different from us?
- 13. What can you do to promote fairness and justice in your everyday life?
- 14. How can you use your voice to make a positive difference, like Ruth did?






**Justice Scales Activity Sheet**



**Hint:** think about issues that relate to climate change.




