Meet our friends in South Africa

Global Goal 6: Clean Water and Sanitation



Ensure availability and sustainable management of water and sanitation for all.



One in three people live without sanitation. This is causing unnecessary disease and death. Although huge strides have been made with access to clean drinking water, lack of sanitation is undermining these advances. If we provide affordable equipment and education in hygiene practices, we can stop this senseless suffering and loss of life.

The amazing students in South Africa also told us about the work they are doing to work towards clean water and sanitation. First of all we heard from the Eco-Avengers from Glenhaven Secondary school in Durban South Africa who are doing amazing work in monitoring the quality of their local river. They also created a wonderful biodiversity garden in their school!













Shea O'Connor Combined School in South Africa also spoke to us about their amazing work in testing their water quality, conserving water and managing the wetland that surrounds the school.

Make your own Flowers!



The students in Glenhaven Secondary School, South Africa created beautiful recycled paper flowers for their hospitality department to use as decoration during an important annual event attended by officials. Their goal is to one day open a craft stall at their local market to inspire the community to turn waste into something new and useful—proving that creativity can save both resources and money.



You Will Need

- Used paper (old newspapers, scrap paper, magazines, etc.)
- Tissues (used tissues that are clean and dry, or napkins)
- Scissors (ask an adult for help!)
- Glue or tape
- Colored markers or crayons (optional)
- A stick or straw (for the flower stem)
- Green paper or recycled material (for leaves)

Why This Matters

By reusing paper and tissues, you're helping to reduce waste and protect clean water sources—just like the amazing students in South Africa! Every small action can make a big difference for our planet.

Instructions:

- 1. Gather your used paper and tissues. Make sure everything is clean and dry. If you want colourful flowers, you can decorate your paper with markers or crayons before you start.
- 2. Cut the paper into different sizes of petal shapes—big, medium, and small.
- 3. If you're using tissues, gently fold them and cut out petal shapes for a soft, delicate look.
- 4. Gently curl the edges of the paper petals by wrapping them around a pencil and sliding it off. This will make your petals look more realistic.
- 5. Roll a small piece of paper or tissue into a ball. This will be the centre of your flower.
- 6. Glue or tape it onto the top of your stick or straw.
- 7. Start with the smallest petals. Glue or tape them around the centre of the flower.
- 8. Add medium petals next, followed by the largest ones, layering them to make the flower look full and beautiful.
- 9. Cut out leaf shapes from green paper or another recycled material.
- 10. Glue or tape them onto the stick.
- 11. Let your flower dry completely.
- 12. Once it's ready, you can display it in a jar or give it to someone as a gift!








Global Goals Book Club: Global Goal 6


'The Water Princess' by Susan Verde
