Participation

- [Castleknock Community College](#) (Castleknock, Co. Dublin), who tallied a total of 3,268 daily swaps. Their team went above and beyond in making sure everyone at school was involved and even delivered presentations to all of the first years.

Creativity

- [Beaufort College](#) (Navan, Co. Meath), who displayed outstanding creativity by designing a wide range of engaging promotional materials, including graphic designs, a social media campaign, a dynamic school noticeboard, and even water fountain murals. They also organised a variety of inventive activities at school, including opening the “Beaufort Boutique,” linking with ExamRevision.ie to receive free reusable water bottles, and hosting a water awareness workshop with a facilitator from Concern Worldwide.

Collaboration

From having different student groups and modules get involved in their own unique ways and using designated roles like “Light Detectives,” their campaign gave students ownership and encouraged widespread involvement.
